Purposes of hive checks

- Purposes and Importance
 - Why do hive checks? When not to do hive checks.
- What to never do during a hive check (if you can avoid it)
- Spring, Summer, Fall, Winter How long will it take?

Pre-Check

- Notes & Photos from last check
- Clean clothes, tools, breath and beekeeper
- Specific tools, gear or offerings for the hive

• Tools

- Hive tool(s), Vail, Gloves, Smoker & Fuel, Stand for Supers, Frame holder
- Knife, Wall Paper Scrapper, Duct Tape, Sharpie Pen, Level

- Hive check steps
 - Take your time Allow 30 minutes start to finish
 - Pre-check: hive outside and grounds, entrances
 - What are the bees doing? Why?
 - Smoke Wait 6 minutes
 - Remove hive covers
 - Checking Hive Body Supers and Frames
 - Start at the wall with the least number of bees and/or with a gap to the wall
 - Move super to get to super below
 - Safe, stable, towards sun if possible for incoming foragers
 - Check bottom board
 - Check hive platform
 - Reassemble and rebuild the hive
 - Closing the hive

 - Summer May 1 to Labor Day
 - Fall August 1 to Halloween
 - Late Fall Halloween to Thanksgiving
 - Winter Thanksgiving to Easter
